Meetings

Publisher's Statement

Steps in a Home Energy Checkup

While you can perform some of the steps yourself, a thorough home energy checkup should be conducted by an energy auditor. A professional auditor uses a variety of techniques and equipment to determine the energy efficiency of your home.

Outside—the auditor will begin by inspecting the outside of your home, looking for problems around walls, joints, or doors and windows. Attic—the next stop on your energy assessment may be the attic. The auditor will make sure that you have the right mount of insulation, and check for air leaks, as well as proper ventilation.

Walls—wall insulation should meet recommended R-values and should be evenly applied throughout the structure. If it is attached loosely or has fallen down, it is not doing its job. Your auditor will use a thermographic scanner to inspect your walls to determine if they are insulated properly.

Basement—the auditor will look for air leaks in the area where the basement walls meet the ceiling. If you have a crawlspace, it should be inspected for proper insulation. Next, the heating and cooling system will be checked for regular maintenance. Something as simple as a dirty air filter could be costing you money. Depending on the age of your heating and cooling system and your water heater, the auditor may recommend upgrading to newer, more energy-efficient units.

Ductwork—the auditor will inspect connections to make sure they fit tightly. They must be sealed to keep the conditioned air going where it is supposed to go. Blower **Door Test**—this test measures the overall air tightness of your home. Blower doors consist of a frame and panel that fit inside an exterior door, a fan, and a pressure gauge. As the fan pulls air out of the house, it lowers the interior air pressure. The higher pressure, outside air then flows in through all unsealed openings. With the fan operating, the auditor can spot leaks using an infrared camera or smoke pencil. An energy checkup will reveal the various ways energy is escaping your home. Your auditor may suggest additional ways to save energy, such as installing low-flow faucets and shower heads, or switching to energy-efficient compact-fluorescent lights (CFLs). At the end of the checkup, you will receive a comprehensive report showing which energy-efficiency measures are right for you. Upgrading your home to save energy can reduce your utility bills by up to 30%.

City of Lynchburg Zoning Diagnostic Report Released

Earlier this year, Lynchburg's Department of Community Development partnered with the Lynchburg Planning Commission and Planning Works© to conduct a Zoning Diagnostic Project. A Zoning Diagnostic is simply a review of the Ordinance for consistency with state law and input from the community. The purpose of the diagnostic is to provide the City with a plan on what should be improved, changed or added to enhance the Zoning Ordinance, as well as recommendations on how to revise the Ordinance. In addition to interviews with a broad cross section of City staff and elected/appointed officials from the City's Planning Commission, Board of Zoning Appeals, the Historic Preservation Commission and City Council that work with the zoning ordinance on a regular basis, the City hosted nine public meetings and a series of group presentations which were attended by over 200 people. Input from those meetings, as well as online surveys and social media responses, were used to develop the key findings of the report.

The report findings will be presented to the Planning Commission during their regular meeting on Wednesday, May 9 and to City Council during their Tuesday, June 12 meeting. Fifth Street CDC Offers Commemorative Bricks for Sale

The Fifth Street Community Development Corporation (CDC) announced today the offering of commemorative bricks for sale. The personalized bricks will be used as a border for the tree wells along historic Fifth Street. Money raised in the brick sale will also be used to help fund streetscape improvements on Fifth Street.

Each commemorative brick (4" x 8") can be engraved with a three-line message consisting of 15 characters per line, including spaces and punctuation. For \$50 per engraved brick, purchasers can celebrate their family memories or honor an important person. Businesses, organizations, and churches can also have their names and messages permanently engraved and placed in a highly visible area used by the entire community. (Please note that inscriptions must not be commercial in nature.)

The Fifth Street CDC is a 501(c) (3) non-profit that acts and advocates for the redevelopment of the Fifth Street corridor. In partnership with the City of Lynchburg, businesses and residents, the CDC works to eliminate blight, rehabilitate existing buildings, develop and support commercial ventures including set design and architectural guidelines for future development projects on Fifth Street.


Cape Henry Lighthouse during your summer trip to Virginia Beach

The iconic Cape Henry Lighthouse has implemented a new strategy to raise money for the protection of its exposed and eroded limestone foundation. In partnership with the Virginia Department of Transportation, Preservation Virginia is raising the money necessary to replenish the sand on the top of the dune, to once again protect the foundation of the lighthouse.

Cape Henry's Bucket Brigade provides visitors a tangible way to help the lighthouse in this endeavor. Sand pails with the "Bucket Brigade" logo are available as a keepsake for a \$5 donation. Visitors can fill the bucket with sand (located right before the ascent up the dune). New signs explaining the history of Bucket Brigades dot the ascent to the top of the dune. Once they reach the top, there is an allocated sand dumping spot. The hope is that this "preservation in action" approach will move the lighthouse quickly, in the direction of having a completed dune restoration with in the next two years.
