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Halloween Safety Tips

- Plan costumes that are bright and reflective. Make sure that shoes fit well and that costumes are short enough to prevent tripping, entanglement or contact with flame.
- Consider adding reflective tape or striping to costumes and Trick-or-Treat bags for greater visibility.
- Because masks can limit or block eyesight, consider non-toxic makeup and decorative hats as safer alternatives. Hats should fit properly to prevent them from sliding over eyes.
- When shopping for costumes, wigs and accessories look for and purchase those with a label clearly indicating they are flame resistant.
- If a sword, cane, or stick is a part of your child's costume, make sure it is not sharp or too long. A child may be easily hurt by these accessories if he stumbles or trips.
- Obtain flashlights with fresh batteries for all children and their escorts.
- Teach children how to call 9-1-1 (or their local emergency number) if they have an emergency or become lost.

CARVING A NICHE:

- Small children should never carve pumpkins. Children can draw a face with markers. Then parents can do the cutting.
- Votive candles are safest for candle-lit pumpkins.
- Candlelit pumpkins should be placed on a sturdy table, away from curtains and other flammable objects, and should never be left unattended.

HOME SAFE HOME:

- To keep homes safe for visiting trick-or-treaters, parents should remove from the porch and front yard anything a child could trip over such as garden hoses, toys, bikes and lawn decorations.
- Parents should check outdoor lights and replace burned-out bulbs.
- Wet leaves should be swept from sidewalks and steps.
- Restrain pets so they do not inadvertently jump on or bite a trick-or-treater.

Point of Honor to Host Day at the Point

The 14th Annual Fall Festival, Day at the Point, will be held on Saturday, October 1 from 10:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. on the grounds of Point of Honor, 112 Cabell Street, in Lynchburg. Admission is free. The event brings living history, food, kid's games and crafts, period music, and more to Point of Honor each year. The historic home, the seat of a 750 acre plantation built in 1815 by the Cabell family, is among the finest examples of Federal architecture in Piedmont Virginia.

The event will feature a number of new presentations and activities reflective of Point of Honor during the Civil War as part of the Civil War Sesquicentennial. From 1861-1865, the home was owned by Col. Robert Owen and his wife, Narcissa. He was president of the Virginia and Tennessee Railroad, a vital supply line for the Confederacy. The railroad moved supplies and soldiers to the front and brought thousands of wounded back to Lynchburg's hospitals. Narcissa and many Lynchburg women made clothing and gathered supplies for the troops and worked in the hospitals. Costumed interpreters will portray Col. and Mrs. Owen and Civil War reenactors will demonstrate soldier life and perform musket firing demonstrations during the day. Dr. John Arnold will also be on hand discussing Civil War period medicine.

Musical performers include Jim Robertson, The McKenzies, and Bill Smith of Wise, Virginia, each playing a variety of period music on acoustic instruments. Interpreters will be in costume portraying Dr. George Cabell, Lucy Oney, and frontiersmen. A full size batteau, The Morning Star, will be on the grounds and there will be a quilt exhibit, open hearth cooking, spinning and weaving, furniture making, demonstrations by the Piedmont Beekeepers, and much more.

Both modern and historic kid's games and activities are planned along with a jump castle, the critters from the Nature Zone, and Primrose the Cow. Food will include Brunswick stew, barbecue, hot dogs, a bake sale of home-made items, popcorn, cotton candy, and an apple pie baking contest.

Guided tours of Point of Honor will be available all day, and walking tours of historic Daniel's Hill will take place at 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. The public may also tour the exhibit, Medicine in Early Virginia. The Gift Shop will offer 10% off with many unique gifts, books, prints, and ceramics. Authors Deanna Klingel (Avery's Battlefield and other books for children), Gene Tomlin (The First Decade of the Lynchburg, Virginia Free Public Schools), and Nancy Marion (The Canal on the James), will be on hand to sell and sign books.

City of Lynchburg Receives Award for Development of Riverfront Park

The Virginia Recreation and Parks Society has awarded the City of Lynchburg the 2010 Best New Facility Award (for cities with a population of 50,001- 100,000) for the development of Riverfront Park. The park, located at 1000 Jefferson Street, reopened in May 2010 with the addition of extensive new park features. The award was accepted by the Lynchburg Parks and Recreation Department at the recent VRPS annual conference in Norfolk.

Riverfront Park's primary design included development of the park as a component of downtown economic redevelopment, best practices for environmental storm water management, recognition of both the cultural and natural history of the site, and creating a modern, open space for the 21st century, all reflecting the City's commitment to sustainability. Most notably, the park design reflects an innovative approach to storm water management for the seven acre park and downtown area. The extensive landscaped rain gardens, permeable paving, and vegetated swales have the potential to naturally treat 11 acres of storm water runoff before it enters the James River. Other elements of the park include a new fountain, plaza, extensive landscaping, and stage area to support events.

Riverfront Park provides a public space for residents of the Hill City to enjoy their close proximity to the James River as well as vital connections to existing resources including the James River Heritage Trail System and Percival's Island Natural Area. The park is the venue for Friday Cheers and other major special events, attracting many visitors to the downtown area. In addition, the park serves as an economic driver to attract new businesses and reinvestment in the downtown area that contribute to the success of the City.
